

ID THEFT: FRAUDULENT UNEMPLOYMENT CLAIM AND RECEIPT OF 1099-G FORM

As you may know, thousands of fraudulent ID theft unemployment claims have been filed by "impostors" during the pandemic. Recently, the Michigan Unemployment Insurance Agency (UIA) issued 1099-G forms to individuals who received unemployment benefits, including some individuals who had a fraudulent claim filed under their name and social security number. The receipt of the 1099-G form usually indicates that the UIA issued unemployment benefit payments to the impostor at some point. The UIA has not yet acted internally to stop the issuance of 1099-G forms on all the fraudulent claims.

Unfortunately, the issuance of the 1099-G form on a fraudulent claim may adversely affect you when it comes to filing your Calendar Year 2020 income taxes with both the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and the Michigan Department of Treasury (MDT). This is because unemployment benefits are considered taxable income at both the federal and state level.

If you received a 1099-G from the UIA and did not receive unemployment benefits during Calendar Year 2020, you need to take action. Failing to act could result in all, or a portion of, your income tax refund being withheld, or you may also receive notice of unpaid income tax along with an interest assessment and monetary penalties.

Here are the recommended steps for you to take:

First, carefully review the "Identity Theft" insert that came with 1099-G issued to you. Follow those directions as appropriate.

Second, make sure you filed a "Statement of Identity Theft" (UIA Form 6349) with the UIA. If you did not, please do so promptly.

Third, make sure you reported the ID theft on the UIA's web site, if you have not already done so.

 Here is a direct link to the site where you can report this ID theft: https://miwam.unemployment.state.mi.us/ClmMiWAM/ /#2 **Fourth**, when you file your income tax returns, you should make both the IRS and MDT aware that you are **not** reporting the unemployment compensation income because you did not receive such payments. Below is a template letter you can use:

- If you file your tax returns in paper/hardcopy form, then it is recommended that you attach the letter to the front of the return and include a copy of your "Statement of Identity Theft" (UIA Form 6349).
- If you file your tax returns electronically, then it is recommended that you mail the
 letter to the IRS and MDT, and include a copy of your "Statement of Identity Theft"
 (UIA Form 6349) and a copy of the front page of your tax return. Be sure to mail that
 letter certified mail so you have confirmation that the letter was received by the IRS
 and MDT.

Fifth, you should consider filing an "Identity Theft Affidavit" with the IRS indicating that you were a victim of identity theft.

Sixth, be sure to keep copies of all documents that you send or receive associated with the fraudulent ID theft unemployment claim. If your income tax return is intercepted, or if you are contacted by the UIA, IRS or MDT about unpaid taxes or are contacted about a further investigation, you will then be able to establish that you took all necessary steps to report the ID theft and that you promptly and properly notified all governmental agencies about the ID theft.
